## **Enriching the Curriculum**

We aim to provide frequent, varied and exciting enrichment opportunities for all children in all year groups. These opportunities are designed to engage children's learning and to give them enjoyable experiences and knowledge of the world. Enrichment gives children opportunities to try new and varied activities that may not strictly fit into the curriculum, but that develop our school values (and values for life) such as aspiration, compassion, confidence, resilience and love of learning.

In KS1 and KS2 each class will have a significant trip out at some point over the year. In addition, each class will engage in several other enrichment activities, such as workshops or visitors into school, local walks, visits to places of worship, visits in the community, 'lambing live' etc.

Children in Early Years will have a separately planned programme of enrichment that will be communicated to you by the year group teachers.

We are just finalising plans and bookings for this year and will then communicate these plans to parents/carers (hopefully by half term). This means you will

have plenty of notice as to what is coming up. Paid for trips will then be added to Parent Pay giving parents/carers a longer period of time to pay and give consent. We always aim to keep the cost down to as low as is possible. It is often transport costs that are the most costly!

# Supporting Your Child With Reading At Home

Parents hear all the time that it's important to read to kids. But why exactly is that? The benefits of reading together go far beyond learning to read.

Reading to young children is an important way to help them build language skills. It exposes them to new words and ways of using language. It also helps them learn general information about the world, which makes it easier for them to learn about new subjects once they get to school.

Books also help children build empathy and learn how to handle challenging feelings. Parents can use reading time as a chance to talk about emotions and how to cope with them. For example, you might say: "Have you ever felt as angry as the girl in this book? What would you do if you did?"

Even a few minutes of reading together gives you and your child a chance to slow down and connect with each other. The experience of sitting with you and hearing your voice also engages their brain in a way that makes learning easier.

There's no one right way to read to your child. You can read to them in any language, or multiple languages. You can do it at the same time every day or change up the routine. Whatever works for you. The important thing is for your child to hear words and language and to have books be part of their daily life. Any steps you're able to take can make a big difference.

Here at Meltham Moor, every child in school is given a reading scheme book at a level that is assessed as appropriate to them. Please can you support your child to read this book.

There is nothing wrong with reading a book more than once- in fact we actively encourage it.

- -First time to decode the words (sound them out using phonetic knowledge).
- -Second time for fluency (accuracy).
- -Third time for understanding (to discuss and ask questions about what happens)

The children will also choose a reading for pleasure book. This may be a book they need to share with an adult, read together or even have read to them-these books are entirely the children's choice and are chosen for pleasure rather than to match their ability level.

Ideally, we'd love every child to read every day but we know how busy family life can get. Please aim for 3 or 4 times a week at least. Each class has their own days for changing reading books, which will have been communicated to you. The older children can change their own book whenever they return them by will be checked once a week.

Ways to help your early readers at home:

- Work on listening skills.
- Practise segmenting (robot talk) and blending.
- Look for familiar sounds and words in the world around you.
- Watch the phonics videos on Class Dojo and learn the patters with your child.
- Practise new sounds and graphemes.
- When your child begins to come home with books try to read with your child every day.
